ORAL COMMUNICATIONS – F2M16-4

1. **Christian CRUZ**, 930 Colorado Boulevard, noted that he was speaking on behalf of W.E.L.L, Water Education for Latino Leaders, which was an annual conference for elected officials from Northern California down to the Mexican border to learn about water issues in the State of California. The focus of the conference was on education of the economics, infrastructure, and financing of water projects in California. He noted that this year's conference would be held on March 4-5, 2016 and he invited the City Council to attend.
2. **John LEUNG**, 1402 North Vosburg Drive, Azusa, representing the San Gabriel Valley Municipal Water District, encouraged Council members to attend the W.E.L.L. conference as he felt the issue of water was a very important topic for the State of California and participation by leaders such as the City Council was critical.
3. **Alex RIVEST**, 815 South Almansor Street, expressed his opposition to a parking structure at Almansor Park because he felt no demand for parking existed. He noted that his observations of the existing lot over a period of a few weeks this month revealed that the lot was never full. He presented his car counts to the City Council, a copy of which is on file in the City Clerk's Office. He also expressed concern regarding the impact a 400 space parking structure could have upon a 2 lane street. He felt the City could save money and resources by not building a parking structure, given he had not witnesses a demand for it.
4. **Debra GARCIA**, 2312 South Westboro Avenue, felt a parking structure at Almansor Park was warranted, especially during peak-use periods when AYSO was in season when there were thousands of kids participating. She noted a parking structure would allow more people to access the park which was a great resource. She added that she hoped the design of the structure would look nice and blend in with the green space of the park.
5. **Sandra NEEDS**, 1141 South Monterey, noted her opposition to a parking structure at Almansor Park. She was concerned about the potential traffic congestion it could cause and the fact that a structure could obstruct the view of a lovely park. She also felt a parking structure could have a negative effect on housing values in the area.
6. **James DOTY**, 1224 South Fourth Street, expressed his support for a parking structure at Almansor Park, noting that the use of the park increased significantly during the spring and summer when soccer and baseball were in season. He added that the AYSO Region 60 organization was also in support of a parking structure.
7. **Darlene CHAPA**, noted that she did not support a parking structure at Almansor Park as it would ruin the view of the park for the homes across the street. She did not wish to trade in a view of tennis courts for a view of a block of concrete. She suggested the existing surface lots be expanded if more parking was needed.
8. **Ralph RAMIREZ**, 1141 South Monterey, noted his concern was primarily with the EIR and ensuring it considers issues such as traffic congestion, potential impacts on children

at the nearby school and whether the current two-lane street could accommodate such a structure. He felt these were important issues and should be included as a part of that input in the preliminary stages of the EIR. He also believed the adjacent parking lot areas, such as those at the church and school, should be considered as part of the area in the EIR report.

9. **Brian OTIS**, 310 North Monterey, Council President at Emmaus Lutheran Church, noted that he had recently received a contract proposal from City staff offering to lease the church's back parking lot which had about 60 spaces. His church council had approved this agreement at its last meeting and was happy to lease the parking spaces to the City with the only condition being that the City repaved the parking lot surface. He added that although it had not yet been discussed by the church council, he strongly suspected that if the City needed an additional 100 spaces, the front parking lot of Emmaus could also be leased, with the same condition that the City repave the lot. With respect to concerns expressed by the church Council related to a potential parking structure, they were primarily worried about the appearance, that it might block the beautiful expansive view of the park. It might also block the view of police officers who would like to look into the park. They also expressed concern about noise problems, both with regard to car alarms that would go off and possibly kids racing up and down the structure, and generally speaking they were also concerned about the possibility of people looking at the parking lot from an elevated space onto a school. They were concerned about safety issues there. However, the church Council was very much in agreement about leasing the lot to the City and were pleased to help the City out with its parking needs and to have the City help the church out by repaving the lot. Mayor **AYALA** noted that staff could follow up with the church on this option.
10. **Mayra MEDINA**, 721 South Almansor Street, pointed out that for about the last three years she has lived right in front of the park on Almansor Street and that she supported the parking structure. She felt it was a nightmare to get off from work, drive home and then discover no street parking was available near her home. She noted that because her building did not provide onsite parking she often had to park on streets three to five blocks away from her home. She added that her family's frustration with this parking situation was making them think of moving.
11. **Lola ARMENDARIZ**, noted she attended the Parks and Recreation Commission meeting when the parking structure was discussed and urged the residents in attendance to come to a City Council meeting and express their opposition. As far as community meetings were concerned, she felt the City should have had them on-going and that the City owed the residents more notice than a meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission. As far as the argument that a parking structure would deter people from parking in front of residences on Almansor Street, once those people who were parking on Almansor Street went into the structure, new people would continue to find spots there in front of the residences. She noted that this was an issue where the City needed to involve the community more and especially the people in the immediate area.

Mayor **AYALA** asked if staff could provide a summary of where the City was at in the process and what was being proposed at this time, noting that the concept may not be set in stone at this point. Director of Community Services **RAY** reported that currently staff was conducting some background work: a topographical survey, soils investigation as well as soliciting proposals for the environmental study work. However, nothing was

set in stone and the project was fluid and could be changed at any time, at the will of the City Council. Ultimately it would be the City Council's decision on what would or would not be built. He explained that currently there were two parking lots with three tennis courts in between them. The proposed plan, which was previously presented to the City Council, was to take the two parking lots and tennis courts and join them into one large lot and go one story up. This would turn about 97 spaces into almost 400 spaces. He noted that Almansor Park was greatly impacted by numerous users during AYSO soccer and baseball season. The goal was to try to get the cars off of the streets and out of the residential neighborhoods and put them into the park, where it is safer for everyone concerned. Building this structure would help do that and would also alleviate traffic by decreasing the amount of time vehicles would spend circling around the area looking for street parking.

Dr. **PLACIDO** asked whether the City leased parking spaces from the Emmaus Church lot in the past because there was not sufficient parking at Almansor Park. Mr. **RAY** noted that Dr. Placido was correct; the City leased a lot from Emmaus back in the mid-80s and that lease was active until about seven years ago when somehow it was terminated. He added that he was currently working with Emmaus to have that lease re-established to add another parking option, in addition to the structure, because it provided parking right next to the fields. Dr. **PLACIDO** noted that the thousands of kids that played in Alhambra's Little League program were residents of Alhambra and needed a place to play. He noted he could see where the increase demand for parking this created made a parking structure warranted. He added that on the 4th of July people attending the fireworks show had to park down on Valley Boulevard or close to Main Street and walk because there was not enough parking. In the summertime, as Almansor Court banquets increase and the golf course becomes busier, during some events, parking was a real stretch. Whether a study is done or not, just from personal experience, he noted that in the summer there was tremendous demand for parking at Almansor Park. City Manager **SWINK** added that construction of a parking structure was not to bring more people into the park, but rather to give adequate parking for those who currently use the park and need it. The structure would take cars off of Adams and Almansor and out of the surrounding neighborhood and side streets and put them in the parking structure.

Councilmember **MESSINA** asked about the height of the structure and how many stories it would be. Responding, Mr. **RAY** explained that it would be one story, ground level, plus one story up. The overall height would be less than that of a residential home, about a 14 foot clearance. Councilmember **SHAM** noted that landscaping and other elements could be used to soften the look of the structure, but pointed out that it was still early in the process and more details would be forthcoming. Mr. **RAY** added staff could also try and take the height down a couple feet, not to where it was underground, but down to soften the height also.

Mayor **AYALA** remarked that he thought the basic premise was the City wanted to allow families to have access to the park; the cars are already there and the goal was to meet that demand. He noted that of the five or six parks in the City, maybe two or three were accessible for the people to go to for their health and fitness activities, whether it was baseball, soccer, basketball, or other recreational activities. This was something that was important to this Council and for many residents in the City. He explained that he was vested in the City in terms of sports programs because he coached both baseball and soccer for approximately the last five years and he had witnessed firsthand the need to increase parking for the area. He noted his support for a parking structure. It was a

project that he wished to work with the community on to help shape it and also to come up with ways to enhance different park opportunities. He concluded by noting that there would be an approval process and that nothing was set in stone at this point, both literally and figuratively.
